


Hello my name is Lady Alys du Bois and I am interested in being considered for the position of Seneschal in January of 2017.





7/29/16 – AMERICAN STUDENT FINDS MEDIEVAL KITE BROOCH IN IRELAND - DUBLIN, IRELAND- An American student from New York University was taking a tour of Ireland's Omey Island with archaeologist Michael Gibbons when she discovered a twelfth-century kite brooch in some rabbit burrows. The brooch would have been used to fasten a cloak or shawl. "I kept it with me until I caught up with Michael and he was very intrigued," Gibbons told *Irish Central*. "He had me take him back to the site at which I found it. I didn't fully realize how important the find was at the time. Now, I'm amazed and surprised and I'm very happy that I was able to place it in the hands of people who would appreciate it." 7/21/16 – ANGLO-SAXON CEMETERY FOUND IN A BRONZE AGE BARROW - LEICESTER, ENGLAND- A team led by Gavin Speed of the University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS) excavated the site of a Bronze Age barrow in central England ahead of the construction of a housing development. A stone ax dating to the Neolithic period was found in the backfill of the barrow ditch, suggesting that use of the site could date back 6,000 years. "By the Iron Age the barrow had partly eroded and its ditches had silted up but much of the mound was likely still upstanding, making it a visible landmark in the local landscape even if its original purpose and meaning had changed," Speed told the *Loughborough Echo*. The site was used for at least 12 burials during the Anglo-Saxon period. These skeletons were poorly preserved, but a pottery vessel, spears, knives, a spade, a brooch, and the boss and studs of a shield were recovered. Some scholars think that the Anglo-Saxons may have reused Bronze Age barrows for burials as a display of power through connection to the past.

7/15/16 – ROMAN MOSAIC DISCOVERED IN CYPRUS - LARNACA, CYPRUS- The AFP reports that a Roman-period mosaic thought to depict the 12 labors of Hercules has been discovered by sewerage workers in an area that was once part of the Roman city of Kition. So far, a section of the mosaic measuring 62 feet long and 23 feet wide has been uncovered. "The intention is to transfer it to a museum, to build a specific room [where it will be displayed] because this is the best way to protect it," said Transport Minister Marios Demetriades. <http://www.abc.net.au/news/2016-07-15/rare-roman-mosaic-uncovered-in-cyprus/7631368>

7/15/16 - LARGE ANGLO-SAXON BUILDING UNEARTHED IN SCOTLAND - EAST LOTHIAN, SCOTLAND- *The East Lothian Courier* reports that the foundations of a large Anglo-Saxon building dated to about 1,200 years ago have been found in a field in Aberlady, a stop on a Christian pilgrimage route located on Scotland's eastern coast. Archaeologists from AOC Archaeology Group and a team of volunteers began

looking for the remains of a Anglo-Saxon timber halls after a large concentration of metal artifacts was discovered in the field. It may have been monastic, or a feast hall or a royal site, said Ian Malcolm of the Aberlady Conservation and History Society. There have been other excavations but no evidence of a structure on this scale has been discovered. The excavation also revealed a paved area with a pit that may have held the original eighth-century Northumbrian Cross. There may have also been a workshop area, where the team discovered pieces of bone, a carved antler, a ninth-century coin, and two bone combs. 7/12/16 - "HOLY ISLAND" EXCAVATION REVEALS POSSIBLE TOWER FOUNDATION - NEWCASTLE, ENGLAND. A team led by archaeologist Richard Carlton of The Archaeological Practice has found traces of two structures on Lindisfarne, an island off the northeast coast of England known for its seventh-century priory and Christian saints. One trench revealed the foundation of a massive wall that may have been the foundation for a tower built without mortar, probably during the early medieval period. A second trench revealed traces of a similar structure that may have been a church. Historical sources dating to the eighth century refer to two churches, a guesthouse, a dormitory, and a watchtower on Lindisfarne. Holy Island is one of the most significant sites in Britain in terms of early medieval heritage, there is a real possibility that we have uncovered two very significant buildings associated with the early Christian foundation of the priory which could provide a tangible link to the time of St. Cuthbert, Sara Rushton of Northumberland County Council told the *Berwick Advertiser*. <http://www.berwick-advertiser.co.uk/news/local-news/all-news/archaeologists-find-st-cuthbert-s-tower-1-4175447>

7/11/16 - ANGLO-SAXON GRAVE MARKER FOUND - LINDISFARNE, ENGLAND. A volunteer working on an excavation on Lindisfarne Island off England's northwest coast has discovered an Anglo-Saxon grave marker dating to the mid-seventh or eighth century A.D. According to the *BBC*, the team is searching for evidence of the earliest monastery on the island, and the marker may prove to be an important clue to its location. "It's unimpeachable evidence for Anglo-Saxon activity and confirms we're hot on the trail of the very earliest monastery here in Lindisfarne," says Durham University archaeologist David Petts, who is the project's co-director. The name on the stone appears to end in *with*, which is common in Anglo-Saxon names. Scholars are still deciphering the rest of the letters on the grave marker. <http://www.bbc.com/news/uk-england-tyne-36712209>

7/11/16 - NEW FINDINGS AT A ROYAL DANISH CASTLE - VORDINGBORG, DENMARK. Excavations at a twelfth-century castle on the south coast of the Danish island of Zealand have shown much of its fortifications were built during the reign of a king who was previously not believed to have had a role in its the

construction. *The Local* reports that Vordingborg Castle was originally built by King Valdemar the Great, and that scholars believed subsequent construction at the site was conducted by the Danish kings Valdemar II and Valdemar IV. But now archaeologists have dated extensive wood remains at the site to the late twelfth century, when Denmark was ruled by King Canute VI. "He didn't just build over the castle, he expanded it continuously," says Aarhus University archaeologist Lars Sass Jensen. "He was, in other words, a king that invested heavily in the site as well as in its political function as a base for Baltic Sea expansion." <http://www.thelocal.dk/20160711/history-of-danish-royal-castle-to-be-rewritten>

7/7/16 - ROMAN BELT BUCKLE UNEARTHED IN LEICESTER - LEICESTER, ENGLAND. A team of archaeologists from University of Leicester Archaeological Services excavated 83 skeletons in a Late Roman cemetery in Leicester's West End. In one of the burials, they found the remains of a middle-aged man who had been buried wearing a type of belt often worn by soldiers stationed on the eastern frontier of the Roman Empire. The survival of the delicate thin sheet bronze belt plate is remarkable, post-excavation manager Nick Cooper told the *Leicester Mercury*. The belt plate, decorated with interlocking spirals, was probably riveted to a wide leather belt or girdle. It had a thinner strap, capped with a tapered strap end, that ran through the buckle to secure it. The strap end features crouching dogs on either side, while the buckle bears images of dolphin heads. The condition of the man's skeleton supports the idea that he had been a soldier. The researchers found evidence of a healed fracture in his left forearm, perhaps from warding off a blow with a raised arm, and signs of muscle damage in his upper right arm and shoulder. 7/1/16 - MEDIEVAL BURIALS UNEARTHED IN WALES - PEMBROKESHIRE, WALES. Excavations at an early medieval chapel graveyard on a beach in southwest Wales have revealed Christian burials dating to the early sixth century, making them contemporaries of St. David, the patron saint of Wales. *BBC News* reports that analysis of skeletons found at similar sites in the region shows that some belonged to people who were not local to the area, but had been born in continental Europe and Ireland. Initial results of the recently discovered remains suggests similar diversity in the group. The Dyfed Archaeological trust is conducting the excavation of the cemetery because the burials are at risk of being washed out to sea.
